VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE

In most organizations, the IT (Information Technology) Team is a small group of miracle workers who solve problems that most of us never even knew existed, nor could we understand if we did. NEST has an IT Team too, and the work that it does is essential to keep the organization running and able to do what it does. Here is just a peek into the work they do and why it's so important.

Sheila Sullivan is the IT Team Chair and its driving force. She is supported by five team members (pictured above) who share the work of troubleshooting, researching, compiling, educating and many other processes that are responsible for NEST's smooth operation.

This team supports a group in NEST we call "Village Builders." The team leaders and the board are the backbone of the organization. To quote Linda Shaw, the Volunteer Chair, "The IT Team makes things simple for us so we can just do our jobs."

Sheila Sullivan, the IT Team chair, has been part of NEST since its infancy. Recruited by a neighbor, Corrie Bovier, NEST's first president, Sheila agreed to help with IT and eventually ended up the team's chair, mostly by default. She never skipped a beat.

It would be hard to find anyone more appreciated or respected by the Village Builders than Sheila. Current president and IT team member Skip Shaw cites one of many examples of how much her leadership is valued. "When a number of us were experiencing frustrations with the limiting reporting available with the original software, Sheila found an outside source to create the database we needed. Her team now produces a monthly set of reports that gives the Executive Committee much better insight into our operations. This allows us to make betterinformed decisions on behalf of our members." Corrie Bovier feels similarly. "Without Sheila I doubt the NEST would have been successful in implementing the NEST software or setting up a system to capture organizational documents and access. Sheila taught herself to use the system, figured out how to localize it for NEST and hand-held the rest of us in coming up to speed on it."

Recent Member Team Chair Ellen deGroof offers a slightly different perspective. "Sheila has come to my house on multiple occasions for tutorial sessions to improve my very rudimentary computer skills. She is quick to respond when I have a question about how to do something on the computer or how to get any data/information I may desire, even when she is traveling."

Over the past year, Sheila has been assembling an accomplished team, expanding the possibilities of NEST. The workload is spread more evenly. The whole team has increased the profile of the IT process as it is being used more widely and becoming more integral to the organization.

2022-2023 SPEAKER SERIES: AGING IN PLACE: WHAT'S YOUR PLAN?



Kara Gansmann shared the best ways to protect your assets for Estate and Long Term Care planning

Kara shared her expertise on essential estate planning tools, asset protection and longterm care planning; Powers of Attorney and how to determine if yours is "hot" enough; Wills versus Trusts and determining which one makes the most sense for you; how estate plans from out of state impact you in North Carolina; the best steps to take now to protect your assets for long term care; and how to find and pay for quality long term care.

And, our last program in the series, is **How to Masterfully Manage Your Own Medications** on Tuesday, May 16th. Denise Hayes, RPh, MS, and owner of The Apothecary at St. James, will discuss how to speak with your doctors to better understand and manage your medications safely; how to organize your medications at home; and, best ways to compare medication pricing and services.
